In 2021, Canada passed a bill to align Canadian laws with UNDRIP

What is it?:

UNDRIP creates a "Universal framework of minimum standards for the **survival**, **dignity and well-being** of the **Indigenous Peoples**" of Canada

What else?:

UNDRIP contributes to pre-existing human rights guidelines and fundamental freedoms for Indigenous Peoples

UNDRIP isn't legally binding
 it is a set of guidelines and
 suggestions that can influence or
 change laws and policies

- But, by passing the bill on UNDRIP, Canada has committed to aligning Canada's laws with UNDRIP
