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### 1. Introduction

The Native Women's Association of Canada (NWAC) held the Early Childhood Development Networking Forum, "From Policy to Action: Sharing best practices in Early Childhood Development to achieve a brighter future for Aboriginal children," at the Saskatoon Inn, in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, from March 22 to 24, 2011.

The vision for the event was to provide a networking opportunity for Early Childhood Educators working with Aboriginal children from across Canada.

The event featured two keynote addresses, presentations by delegates, and time for working sessions and discussion.

Raven Events was hired in December to assist with the management of the event.

The following report provides an overview of **Raven Events'** areas of responsibility, reports on successes and challenges, and provides recommendations for improvement and growth of future events.

### 2. Attendance

The ECD Networking Forum welcomed over 40 guests, including 28 delegates, as well as speakers, elders, and NWAC staff.

### **Recommendations for Improvement and Growth**

✓ Continue to grow the NWAC data base to support the promotion of events, increase NWAC's public profile, raise awareness for NWAC initiatives and their value and increase participation.

### 3. Entertainment

On the morning of March 23, a welcome song (the Bear Song) was sung by members of the NWAC Health Team (Erin Wolski, Melanie Wabano, Jade Harper, and Billie Allan). Violet Naytowhow, from Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, sang a song to the Creator, and the St. Mary Oskayak Dance Troupe performed two jigging dance numbers.

At the banquet on the evening of March 23, Dallas Boyer, a Metis fiddler, and his father, Phil Boyer, performed along with a children's dance group from the James Smith Cree Nation.

### 4. Facilities

The facilities at the Saskatoon Inn were acceptable but dated.

Hotel staff had some difficulties regulating the temperature in the room during the Forum, resulting in several complaints.

Overall, the hotel staff was friendly and able to easily accommodate the needs of the group.

### 5. Registrations and Travel

Invitations were sent out to a list of contacts provided by NWAC. The first invitation went out on January 11, 2011, followed by several reminders. Follow up calls were made in early March to promote the event and encourage registration. The list of all invitees is attached in appendix B, and the invitation can be found in appendix C.

NWAC handled all travel arrangements. Raven Events assisted with the development of the delegate registration and information packages, and distributed information to delegates with regards to travel and other arrangements. The registration form can be found in appendix D, and the registration information package is in appendix E.



There were several cancellations the day of the event, due to harsh winter weather conditions in Saskatchewan.

### **Recommendations for Improvement and Growth**

- ✓ As March is the fiscal year end for many organizations and the resulting work load prevents some of NWAC's target market from participation in events. Event dates earlier in the year may result in higher registration numbers.
- ✓ In order to provide additional support to the NWAC team, all travel arrangements could be delegated to the event management company. Raven Events is familiar with NWAC's administrative and accounting processes and an effective interface can be accomplished easily.

### 6. Delegate Kits and Feedback

The delegate kits were provided in digital format on a memory stick. The kit, not including the linked documents and resources due to volume, is in appendix F.

Delegates received a printed copy of the agenda and some blank paper in NWAC folders. NWAC provided an assortment of bags, pens, pins, whistles, and other items for delegates to choose from. During the course of the event, additional items were provided for distribution by the BC Aboriginal Child Care Society, NAHO, and Health Canada.

In their delegate packages, delegates were given a link to a Forum evaluation, conducted by Raven Events via Survey Monkey. There were 14 responses. A summary of responses is provided in appendix G.

### **Recommendations for Improvement and Growth**

- ✓ Invite all delegates to contribute materials or resources from their organizations into future digital delegate kits.
- ✓ Provide feedback forms in hard copy and give some time at the event to fill them out. This may yield a higher response rate.

### 7. Audio Visual

Raven Events worked with PSAV, the in-house AV provider at the Saskatoon Inn. AV requirements for this event were minimal.

The final AV costs came in \$1,076.58 over budget, due to the last minute addition of two additional flip charts, and a microphone and sound system.



### 8. Budget

The ECD Networking Forum was budgeted at \$69,981.62. Actual costs were \$63,096.13, \$6,885.49 under budget.

The line items showing the most significantly reduced actuals are:

• Hotel Rooms (\$2,188.50 under budget)

The original budget was based on 90 room nights, actual occupancy was 72. NWAC was charged for two no-shows on the first night for delegates unable to arrive due to weather conditions.

Banquet Facilities (\$1,050 under budget)

The breakout rooms included in the original budget were cancelled, as it was decided that it would be better to keep the group together.

• Travel (\$3,825.53 under budget)

NWAC handled all travel budgeting and arrangements.

There was also a shift in the budget, due to the fact that speakers were given gifts in lieu of speaker fees. Much of the \$1,000 that was budgeted for speaker fees went to cover additional costs for entertainment and honoraria for the elders in attendance.

The final event budget is included in appendix H.

### 9. Other Recommendations

### ✓ Develop Corporate Relations Program

NWAC has the potential to form supportive and sustaining corporate partnerships. These partnerships provide benefits to both partners. Most non-profit organizations struggle with financial sustainability. A corporate relations program provides a revenue stream independent from government sources. In addition the relationships formed can add significant capacity to your organization. Corporate partners:

- can make you more visible; expand your audience and reach;
- can enhance your expertise as board members or advisors;
- can support your success by supporting and promoting your mandate, values and goals.

### **PRESENTERS**

DR. MARGO GREENWOOD, Academic Leader of the National Collaborating Centre for Aboriginal Health

Dr. Margo Greenwood, Academic Leader of the National Collaborating Centre for Aboriginal Health, is an Indigenous scholar of Cree ancestry with more than 25 years' experience in the field of early childhood education. Professionally and personally, children have been the focus of her life. She has worked as a frontline caregiver in early childhood services, designed early childhood curriculum, programs,



and evaluations, and taught early childhood education courses at both the college and university levels. As a mother of three, she is personally committed to the continued well-being of children and youth in Canada.

While Margo's focus has been on all children, she is recognized regionally, provincially, nationally and internationally for her work on Aboriginal children. She has served with 25 national and provincial federations, committees and assemblies, and has undertaken work with UNICEF, the United Nations, and the Canadian Reference Group to the World Health Organization Commission on Social Determinants. Margo received the Queen's Jubilee medal in 2002 in recognition of her years of work to promote awareness and policy action on the

rights and well-being of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal children, youth and families. She was also recognized in 2010 as the 'Academic of the Year' by the Confederation of University Faculty Associations' of B.C. for her research contributions to the wider community. Most recently she was honoured with National Aboriginal Achievement Award for Education in 2011.

Currently, Margo is an Associate Professor in both the First Nations Studies Education and programs at the University of Northern British Columbia. Her current research interests include historic and contemporary systemic and structural impacts on the development of early childhood programs and services Canada; the social determinants of health with particular emphasis on colonization and children's rights; and cross-cultural communication and research. Her scholarship and research also includes issues pertaining to Indigenous ways of knowing and being, or Indigenous epistemologies and ontologies. In addition to her teaching and service commitments, Margo has directed a number of research centres and currently leads the National Collaborating Centre for Aboriginal Health, which supports a renewed and inclusive public health system in Canada and Aboriginal ActNow BC, a Ministry of Health-funded collaborative health promotion initiative.

An advocate for Aboriginal women's equality rights, she focuses much of her attention on Aboriginal health research and policy. She has contributed to the advancement of culturally relevant gender based analysis (CRGBA) through her work with various Aboriginal women's organizations in Canada and is honoured to have had the opportunity to work with some of the most innovative leaders in Aboriginal women's health in Canada. Her goal is to continue learning and contributing.

CATHERINE GRAHAM, Director, Metis Center, National Aboriginal Health Organization

Director of the Métis Centre, Catherine Graham has two undergraduate degrees and a Master's in Legal Studies from Carleton University where her studies focused on issues related to Aboriginal Peoples and the law, and violence against women. Carrie Bourassa was born and raised in Regina. Carrie pursued both her undergraduate and graduate degrees at the University of Regina. She earned her Bachelor of Arts Honours degree in Political Science in 1995, graduated with her Master of Arts degree in 1999, and earned her Ph.D. in Social Studies in 2008.



Carrie has worked in several different capacities in her career including Sessional Instructor with the First Nations University of Canada (formerly the Saskatchewan Indian Federated College), Ministerial Assistant, Policy Analyst with the Saskatchewan Provincial government and Manager of Employment Equity at the University of Regina.

Currently, Carrie is following her dream of teaching at the postsecondary level. She is an Associate Professor in the Department of Inter-disciplinary Programs at the First Nations University of Canada teaching Indigenous Health Studies. Carrie's research interests include the impacts of colonization on the health of First Nations and Métis people; creating culturally competent care in health service delivery; Aboriginal community-based health research methodology; Aboriginal end of life care and Aboriginal women's health. Carrie is beginning her second 3

year term as a member of the Canadian Institute for Health Research Standing Committee on Ethics. Carrie is a member of the Native Women's Association of Canada Advisory Committee on Senior Abuse and Aboriginal Women, member of the Saskatchewan RESOLVE Steering Committee and the Métis Centre of the National Aboriginal Health Organization's Métis Research and Ethics Committee. Carrie recently completed a chapter for the Saskatchewan Child Welfare Review entitled Final Summary Review of the Manitoba Child Welfare System for the Saskatchewan Child Welfare Review Report. She is also an accredited Aboriginal Cultural Awareness Program facilitator through the First Nations University of Canada and actively involved in volunteering at community centres including the Regina Métis Sports and Culture Centre. Carrie is also the nominated Principal Investigator of the Indigenous Peoples' Health Research Centre. Marc manages the Child and Family Development Centre for the Tsleil-Waututh Nation and has been the Regional Advisor for AIDP in the Vancouver Coastal area. He sits on the Executive Committee for the Aboriginal Early Childhood Development Association, as treasurer.


