NWAC President's Report

This publication highlights the various activities the President has undertaken throughout the month of October.

LORRAINE WHITMAN

Lorraine Whitman was elected as the President of the Native Women's Association of Canada on September 14, 2019. Prior to her presidency at NWAC, Ms. Whitman served as President of the Nova Scotia Native Women's Association and has been advocating for Indigenous women's rights over the past 45 years.

My Dear Friends,

The month of October was full of many days of honouring and days to mark; Harvest season, International Day of Rural Women, Women's History Month, Treaty day and of course, Thanksgiving. It is a time for celebration for many of our people but at the same time we have always given thanks every day for what we have - including the feast and celebrations that we have. It's not just the feast that we celebrate within one day and many do celebrate thanksgiving. It is up to each individual on how they choose to celebrate.

On this month too, Halloween took place and I do think of the differences and definitions between costumes versus regalia. Regalia is another word for clothing. It is a representation of our culture and depending on the event or situation, the regalia for an Indigenous person may differ. A costume however, is when someone dresses up as something else, for example, Halloween.

On October 1st we held to Treaty Day, a statutory event in Nova Scotia held each year on October 1st.

In 1985, the Supreme Court of Canada confirmed the validity of the Treaty of 1752, signed between *"Jean Baptiste Cope, Chief Sachem of the Tribe of Mick Mack Indians, Inhabiting the Eastern Coast of Said Province,"* and Peregrine Thomas Hopson, Governor of the Province of Nova Scotia – in its ruling of the court case, James Matthew Simon v. the Queen. This ruling not only validated our Aboriginal Treaty rights, but also confirmed the unique relationship which exists between the Mi'kmaq and the Crown, an agreement which is further maintained within the Covenant Chain, a series of interconnected treaties of mutual consent.

In 1986, Grand Chief of the Mi'kmaq nation, Donald Marshall Sr., invited all Mi'kmaw to "observe October 1, 1986, and every year



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thereafter as Treaty Day to commemorate the unique and special relationship that exists between the Mi'kmaq and her Majesty." Since then, the Union of Nova Scotia Mi'kmaq, with the involvement of other reputable Mi'kmaq organizations and associations, has spearheaded the organizing of activities for the celebration of October 1st – Treaty Day.

Treaty Day festivities in Nova Scotia are first and foremost and reflect the beliefs of the Mi'kmaq people with respect to the obligations of our Treaty Rights – an aspiration only possible through the careful planning of various events and activities. Throughout the festivities, the Nova Scotia population are becoming more aware of the Mi'kmaq Nation and our history, which will only enrich their own cultural and historical knowledge of the

Mi'kmaq, but will also enable the Mi'kmaq Nation to be recognized in a manner of which they are deserving.

October also saw some changes in our government with the announcement of the new cabinet ministers, which I felt was a breath of fresh air. I look forward to working with the Ministers in their new roles: Minister Marc Miller as the new Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations, replacing Carolyn Bennett, and Patty Hajdu as the new Minister of Indigenous Services to name a few.

I hope your harvest month was a good one and I look forward to filling you in on the months to come!

October 4th is a day when we honour the lives of missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls and gender diverse people, support grieving families, and create opportunities for healing. The violence experienced by Indigenous women, girls and gender diverse people in Canada is a genocide. In light of COVID-19, NWAC held a livestreaming Virtual Vigil which was initially postponed due to Facebook world-wide technical issues. It did take place however, on Oct 7, and we did commemorate the event in a different way; having youth involved, contributing and showing their way of honouring the family members and poets. Our guest attendees were Bernie Scarf from the Yukon who took us on a virtual walking tour to see the MMIWG statue there and what it signified, a monument to honour the Missing and Murdered women, two-spirit and girls in the Yukon area. We were also honoured to have youth Lily Beth who created a painting to commemorate MMIWG, Julie Pellissier-Lush who quoted poetry and song in commemoration and a beautiful song that was sung by Jeremy Dutcher, Two-Spirit and Juno award winner to



also commemorate. It was a beautiful and unforgettable event.
