Lorraine Whitman was elected as the president of the Native Women's

Association of Canada on September 14, 2019. Prior to her presidency at NWAC, Ms. Whitman served as president of the Nova Scotia Native Women's Association and has been advocating for Indigenous women's rights over the past 45 years.

While short, the President undertook several activities throughout the month of December.

- Hosted Secretary General of the Organization of American States, Luis Almagro, on behalf of NWAC. The goal of the visit was to discuss the implementation of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls' (MMIWG) 231 Calls for Justice. President Whitman was grateful to see the support for MMIWG from a number of Chiefs, including AFN National Chief Perry Bellegarde.
- Attended the Honouring Indigenous Women Reception Red Dress Display in Ottawa on December 4th.
- Visited several fly-in First Nations, including Fort Albany and Kashechewan on December 5th with Mr. Almagro to see firsthand the safety, security, social and economic issues Indigenous people face in remote communities. Participated in high-level discussions on December 6th with NWAC Elders, PTMA presidents, community leaders, experts and academics alongside the Secretary General.
