At this event, NWAC signed a partnership agreement with the World Indigenous Business Network and UN Women. Voted in the 2019 federal election on October 21st in Wolfville, Nova Scotia and promoted Indigenous women's voting participation in a social media campaign funded by Elections Canada. Indigenous women are among the fastest-growing populations in Canada yet are extremely underrepresented as voters and as candidates for elected office.
