MONTHLY MAY REPORT

2023

Spring is full of hope and renewal after the harsh challenges of winter. It's a time to make the most of our days. At the President's office we did just that. Below please find highlighted events. In addition to these events, our office holds daily meetings to vet requests, discuss political news and Indigenous issues. My Interim Adviser, Lisa Smith also provides briefings to me and my team on emerging issues.

On May 2 my office underwent media training with Joan Weinman, NWAC's Chief Communications Strategist. Ms. Weinman gave us an overview of the media and the positives of interacting with them. We discussed interview skills, techniques to better handle the media and how to create compelling messages.

Mel Critch of Manitoba Moon Voices Inc. (MMVI) advised me of a motion that was to be presented by Winnipeg Centre New Democratic Party (NDP) Member of Parliament (MP) Leah Gazan. On May 2, the House of Commons adopted the motion unanimously! It calls on the federal government to declare ongoing violence against Indigenous women, girls, and two-spirit people a national emergency. It also calls on the government to provide an "immediate and substantial investment" to create a public alert system for missing Indigenous women, girls, and two-spirit people. I thanked Ms. Gazan for her motion. I also sent out a Press Release and talked with the National Observer. I told the National Observer that not only is the government not investing in MMIWG2s+ funding, but they are clawing back essential funding in relation to women's shelters.

On May 3, I spoke with City News regarding the University of Toronto (Mississauga campus) research findings about how police repeatedly dismiss and justify violence against Indigenous women in Canada. They asked what this means for Indigenous women and police relations. I advised that the study proves what we already know as Indigenous peoples and the broken relationship between our people and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP).

On May 3, I spoke with APTN regarding the NDP Motion and called again for a state of emergency.

On May 4, myself and Patty Hajdu, Minister of Indigenous Services, announced the expansion of NWAC's Safe Passage initiative with new online tools, as well as the establishment of the Safe Passage Women's Safety Council. The announcement was drafted in January, and we had been waiting on the Minister to release it to the public. The announcement got traction from APTN; therefore, I spoke with them about the program and new safety council. I also spoke about the importance of our PTMAs in this initiative.
On May 4, I spoke with the Globe and Mail, CBC, and the Canadian Press about the National Day of Awareness for the prevention of violence against Indigenous women, also known as Red Dress Day.
May 5 was a busy day! In addition to multiple media interviews (580 CFRA Ottawa, APTN, Associated Press) I participated in NWAC's commemoration event to honour and bring awareness to the thousands of MMIWG2S+ across Canada. Minister Marc Miller, Minister of Crown Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada (CIRNAC) was in attendance at the art unveiling

portion of the agenda. MP Jamie Batiste was also in attendance.



It was a great event that brought attention to the urgent work NWAC is undertaking.

That momentum continued into May 6 when NWAC hosted a MMIWG2S+ Roundtable. Senator Michelle Audette, PTMAs and NWAC staff gathered to discuss the many issues surrounding the genocide against our loved ones. We also discussed NWAC's Action Plan, Our Calls Our Actions, and the Federal Action Plan as well as ways to accelerate their implementation with greater transparency and accountability.

Senator Audette, CEO, Lynne Groulx and I also held a private meeting to discuss upcoming events.

We held a National Apprenticeship Program (NAP) committee meeting on May 23rd to touch base on the progress of the program and the systematic issues therein.

On May 24 we held an Executive Council meeting to touch base on the agenda for our upcoming board meeting among other things.

The truthful testimonies of those women prompted the Viens Commission and its 142 recommendations to repair relations between Indigenous Peoples and Quebec public services.
